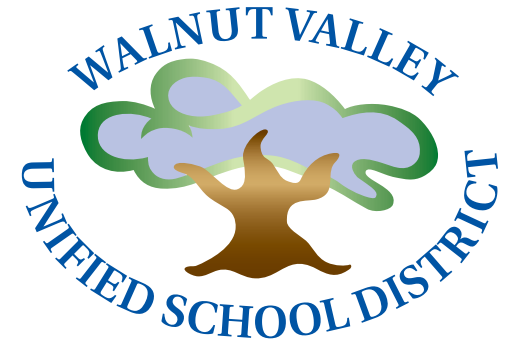

Creating Golden Opportunities

Diamond Bar, Walnut High Win the State’s Highest Academic Honor

Diamond Bar and Walnut high schools have been recognized with 2017 California Gold Ribbon Awards for successfully embracing rigorous academic standards and showing others how to help foster student success.

Diamond Bar High also earned the Exemplary Program in Arts Education Award.

The 275 middle and high school state winners represent examples of excellent teaching, learning, and collaborating, as well as highly successful school climate efforts. Schools applied for the award based on a signature program that can be replicated by other schools.

Diamond Bar High submitted for consideration the school’s Wellness Center and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) programs.

“Diamond Bar High is the only high school in the state staffed by student wellness consultants who are trained in peer counseling and assisting student’s social and emotional needs for the entire school day. We are very proud of the support we are offering our students,” said Principal Reuben Jones.

Walnut High highlighted its IB Career-Related Program (IBCP)/Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Biomedical Science.

WVUSD Dedicated to Music Education

Walnut Valley Unified School District has been honored with the 2017 Best Communities for Music Education designation from the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

A total of 476 districts and 92 schools from coast to coast received the prestigious award for successfully providing music access and education to all students. From elementary bands to choral singers and symphony orchestras, schools are creating a community of learners and showing what they’ve learned to a broader community.

“This is a wonderful reflection of the quality music programs that we offer students throughout our district,” said Superintendent Dr. Taylor. “We are proud to be recognized for setting the bar in offering students access to comprehensive music education!”

America’s Best!

U.S. News & World Report has ranked Diamond Bar and Walnut among the nation’s top high schools in its “2017 America’s Best High Schools” report issued on April 25. Diamond Bar High School earned a gold medal, as it did last year, ranking 43rd in California and 277th in the United States. DBHS placed 105th in STEM high schools. Walnut High School earned a silver medal, ranking 95th in California and 557th in the United States. Both standout schools have been included in the report every year since the publication began its ‘Best High Schools’ search in 2009. Additionally, both schools are named among the “2017 America’s Most Challenging High Schools” by *The Washington Post*.



UPDATE District of Choice

New law continues program for 6 years

Your voice has been heard! The future of the District of Choice (DOC) program is now secure in Walnut Valley. On June 27, Gov. Brown signed the extension trailer bill to be included in the state budget through the 2022-2023 fiscal year. The bill was passed in both the Assembly and Senate unanimously.

DOC has been in existence for 25 years and affects over 3,500 WVUSD students. In addition to bringing significant funding and creating financial stability, the new law will allow the District to continue offering world-class programs that families seek for their children.

DOC gives parents a choice of where to send their child to school no matter the income level or where they live. This simple choice increases school accountability and improves the public education system. Over the past year, WVUSD officials have worked to educate lawmakers and the general public about these benefits.

It has been an uncertain year after a routine extension bill died last summer in the Assembly Appropriations Committee. This outcome is the result of nearly a year of hard work and dedication by parents, staff, students, and community members.

Run, Teach, Eat, Sleep, Repeat! Walnut High Educator Breaks 3 World Records

To say that Walnut High teacher and cross country coach Jerry Knox is passionate about running might be an understatement. He laces up his running shoes five days a week, clocking five-to-eight miles, and 15 miles every Saturday.

Knox usually runs a marathon each month and in the past 11 years has crossed the finish line over 80 times. Last month, he completed his sixth 100-mile race.

Knox dribbled two basketballs throughout a 26.2-mile marathon to earn a Guinness World Record in London. He has also broken three Guinness marathon records in 2017 while jumping rope, wearing lederhosen, and a graduation cap and gown.

Knox displays the race medals in his classroom and aims at inspiring his students to live physically active lives. Sophomore Jason Yen says his marathon-running teacher is setting a good example for fellow students.

"He has a goal and achieves it by practicing and not giving up."

What's next for the vegan athlete? He plans to break the record for skipping during a marathon this fall!

"It's a genuine experience for our students to know it's a process, and the process started somewhere."

DBHS Sprocket Robotics Team Compete at World Championships

Days before Diamond Bar High's competitive robotics team went into battle, Team Sprocket #3473 members worked intently after school making slight modifications on gear intakes, checking the electronic board, and going over the complex CAD designs. The adventurous group of over 30 students geared up for a three-day Orange County regional FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) at UC Irvine.

Earlier, Sprocket finished 9th out of 66 teams in a "neck-to-neck" race during the regional FRC tourney in San Diego.

"It was the best we ever performed," said senior Casey Chen, one of the team's two passionate engineering captains. "This is a really good bot!"

Better yet, it was the first time in the team's history that Team Sprocket qualified to be an alliance captain, able to select the two other teams to play with during playoff matches, according to senior Cathy Chang, the team's business captain.

"FIRST is a really dynamic game. It changes throughout the season," she added. "Our team is constantly working to make our robot the best."

The hard work paid off when Team Sprocket was awarded a wild-card invitation to attend the World Championships in Houston, Texas held on April 19-22. Sprocket became the highest achieving team in the school's history, qualifying for international event for the first time

Teachers Committed to Excellence Writing Workshop Sharpens Skills

Making a commitment to turn classrooms into writing workshops has produced significant results for Collegewood Elementary teachers Therapi Kaplan and Elisabeth Jones.

Two years ago, the educators were determined to find a way to help students become better writers. That summer, they attended a five-day intensive Teachers College Reading and Writing Institute at Columbia University led by renowned educator Lucy Calkins. Applying what they learned, Kaplan has witnessed a “night and day” difference in the children’s writing skills.

“They improve two-to-three grade levels in their writing. I get the chills just thinking about it!”

During 45-minute active writing sessions, the instructors confer with individuals and small groups while offering feedback as the students craft their writing.

“This differentiated instruction is giving different kids what they need,” added Jones who teaches a 3rd-4th grade combo class. “And it’s unlocked the door for writing.”



The classes wrapped up a new chapter in their learning with a publishing party to celebrate a batch of literary opinion and compare and contrast essays.

In total, over 100 Walnut Valley K-8 educators currently implement the successful writing workshop program.

Students make Global Connections



Chaparral Middle School 8th grader Izzy Reedy and a dozen classmates learned about culture, education, weather, and even sports in Tanzania this year. But, it wasn’t by opening a textbook or conducting research on a computer. The Diamond Bar students gained knowledge through a global connection with the Gyekrum Arusha Secondary School, located over 8,500 miles away in East Africa.

Education specialist Kimberly Ramos formed the partnership with the class through the World Education Connection program. Students and teachers got to know each other by communicating back and forth using email and Google Hangout.

“They would ask lots of questions and post photos,” Ramos said about the 21st century-learning

technology. “Anything I received from the teacher, I would post on Google Classroom to share with my kids.”

Ramos said her students embraced the program and were amazed with how many similarities they had with their new friends.

“The kids loved seeing each other. And the things we learned this year have had more meaning because we were able to connect with the other half of the ‘Kilimanjaro Squad’ on a personal level.”

The global teams shared their thoughts on the power of connection during an inaugural World Education Day event.

“Asante Sana!” the students exclaimed in Swahili while waving to one another during the live global broadcast.

“We got to experience the way they live and learn,” Brant said. “I wouldn’t have changed a thing about this experience!”

Students said they also gained appreciation for their own lives after seeing the East African partner school squeeze 80 students inside a class with dirt floors and dilapidated furniture.

“It showed me to be grateful for what I have, and to respect elders and family,” Reedy said.

Valuing Differences Elementary Students Write Friendship Book for ASD Schoolmates

Two C.J. Morris Elementary 3rd graders believe that everyone has a right to have friends, especially students with autism. Nyla Rivera and Kailyn Park feel so strongly that they’ve written a book to support special needs students on their campus.

Last year as a 2nd grader, Rivera noticed a few students sitting alone at recess and lunchtime. One boy was even quietly talking to himself, while another child replied a gruff “leave me alone” when she offered a hello. Rivera didn’t understand why.

“I would see them so quiet, just waiting for a friend,” the eight-year-old explained. “This year, I found out they have autism and they need friends.”

The eight-year-old decided to take action. She recruited her best friend and classmate, Kailyn, and the two girls quickly began spending their free time with kids in the autism spectrum disorder (ASD) class.

“Now they know we’re not strangers,” said nine-year-old Park. “And little by little, they began to trust us and started talking to us.”



This year, the girls collaborated on another project together. They’ve written “Everyone Has a Right” to honor the dozen students in Rochelle Mortensen’s ASD class. The story is intended to be an encourager for the students to make friends.

“If you try, you can do it!” Park says in the story.

Making friends is a real challenge for our students with autism, Mortensen explained. Students identified on the spectrum are impacted in their development of social and communication skills.

“We have social lessons every morning. But with students like Nyla and Kailyn, they can practice these skills and learn to fit in,” she added.

“These two girls have a special bond with the students and wanted to brighten their day with this book,” 3rd grade teacher Shayleen Ojeda said.

Ojeda plans to have the book professionally printed and bound, and offer copies for sale with all proceeds donated to special needs classes in Walnut Valley USD.
